Joined by Catholic Charities Executive Director, Monsignor Kevin Sullivan during their Lenten journey in preparation for the celebration of Easter, His Eminence, Cardinal Timothy Dolan entered the doors of CMCS' Monsignor Boyle Head Start Program. It was all smiles as he was welcomed by the students performing festive songs in their decorative hats depicting farm animals. During this journey, His Eminence visited five different locations apart from Monsignor Boyle to build hope for the weak, the sick, and the forgotten throughout Westchester, the lower Hudson Valley, and



New York City. Many of the parents of our youngsters were on-site to participate in a very joyous roundtable discussion sharing their experiences as parent advocates for their children with Cardinal Dolan and Monsignor Sullivan.

Located in the Norwood section of the North Bronx, Community District 7, an area known for its diversity, Monsignor Boyle Head Start provides childcare services to over 200 children through Head Start/Early Head Start center-based classrooms for those from Birth to 5 years of age and Universal Pre-Kindergarten (4 year-olds) full-day services.

Each classroom is equipped with a Certified Teacher and Assistant Teacher. At the site there are Family Advocates who work with the parents to provide emotional support, Cooks who prepare breakfast, lunch and a healthy afternoon snack each day for all students, Custodial staff and an Education and Site Director who provide educational support to the teachers.

Children's minds are like sponges, exposing children to new experiences at a very young age shows them what the world has to offer. This visit will be memorable. Thank you to Catholic Charities for organizing this visit and helping us to change the trajectory in the lives of our children and families.

Each day at CMCS, there are moments that are so special and conjure a mixture of emotions. A painting done by a child in foster care that contains so much beauty and emotion can evoke an incredible sense of pride to know that we are a part of helping this child grow beyond the trauma and pain they have experienced. Or it could be as simple as a hearty morning "Hello!" we receive from an adult with autism who for years did not have the ability to communicate at any level.

These moments serve as constant reminders of the commitment we make daily for the work that we do and the support made possible by your staunch belief in CMCS and our overall mission and vision. There has been so much happening at CMCS over the last few months and I know you will agree that recent developments have made it possible to serve even more of those who need us. This has been a very exciting time and I am thrilled to share our news.

I am so very excited to share that Cardinal Timothy Dolan visited our Monsignor Boyle Head Start location in March. His visit was such an incredible honor and the children and our staff were so excited; his genuine and heartfelt interactions with the children were touching and endearing!

It is with great anticipation that we look forward to the September 2019 opening of the Cardinal McCloskey Community Charter School. This is a major milestone for the agency and the at-risk families we serve and it was an effort and achievement that was quite literally years in the making. The importance of this school cannot be

overstated for the educational advancement opportunities it will present to the children that we know need it the most. Also, in September we will be expanding

our Day Services for those who live with Autism and Developmental Disabilities at our new location in Ossining, made possible by the incredible generosity of our very good friends and benefactors. We will be holding a ribbon cutting soon and hope you will join us in celebrating this very important work.

Our very own "McCloskey Cares" Mental Health Clinic that opened in January of this year is off to a fantastic start! This program is a tremendous addition to the continuum of care that CMCS provides to children and families; the work that is being done daily in the clinic is helping to address the unspeakable trauma that some of our children have gone through and with this service, they do not have to go through that experience alone! CMCS is grateful to all of the foundations

that awarded us grants this fiscal year.

One of our greatest achievements for the agency is the first time grant award we received from The Hyde and Watson Foundation to renovate the family waiting and visiting rooms at our facility at 529 Courtlandt Avenue in the Bronx. Our goal is to create a safe, welcoming and therapeutic environment for the children and families who receive services at CMCS. This could only have been accomplished by the generosity of The Hyde and Watson Foundation and we are so appreciative of their commitment and faith in our mission.

We have been active online and in your communities as well. We kicked off the Spring season with our wonderful annual Wine Tasting event at the home of our

very generous hosts, Lori and Paul Guillaro. It was the most successful Wine Tasting event to date and it was our privilege to honor the Grossman and Linde Families. We took our CMCS enthusiasm with us at our yearly Walkathon event and the New York City Saint Patrick's Day Parade. Most recently, with your generous support, the children in our foster care programs became "Explorers for a Day" at the Bronx

Zoo with over 130 children and families in attendance.



Cardinal McCloskey Community Charter School


We are excited that the new Cardinal Mc-Closkey Community Charter School is opening for students on August 28th, with the teachers

starting on August 12th. The Charter School currently has 158 students enrolled in Kindergarten and 1st grade, with the capacity to enroll another 15-20 children. The school will occupy four floors in Aquinas High School in the Bronx, a renovated building where they will have a beautiful gymnasium and their own cafeteria.

Jennifer Fedele, who has worked at CMCS since 2003, is the Founding Principal of the Charter School, and Edrick Brown is the

Director of Operations. Since the Charter School hired them in November 2018, they have been hard at work laying the foundation for a successful opening. George Grace, the President of the Board of Directors, and the other board members have been actively involved in the preparations.

The Sanctuary Model is key to the success of the Charter School and differentiates our school from others. This model is a trauma-informed framework that promotes a safe, nurturing and nonviolent environment, where at-risk children can maximize their potential to learn, heal and grow.



A Day To Remember On The Hudson

Each year one of our most important and enjoyable fundraisers of the year takes place in Garrison, New York at the home of Lori and Paul Guillaro. The Guillaro family has hosted the Wine Tasting and Dinner for the past 14 years. 

McCloskey Cares Clinic

The fifth floor of 529 Courtlandt is the location of the new McCloskey Cares Clinic.

After years of planning, the clinic opened in January serving children, families, teens and young adults. The McCloskey Cares Clinic offers a safe, therapeutic environment to those facing life stressors and trauma that can lead to serious mental health problems.

To greet individuals coming to the clinic it was important the visitors entered a bright, welcoming, attractive space putting them at ease. With the support of two foundations, The McKeen Fund and a recent grant from the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, CMCS is able to furnish the waiting room and the counseling rooms with attractive and comfortable chairs, tables, and lighting. A beautiful array of sunny colors and artistic touches make each area unique. Bookcases housing books, games and age-appropriate educational materials are accessible throughout the clinic, ensuring younger visitors have stimulating activities as they and their families wait for appointments. We have also provided our clinicians with essential therapeutic toys, games and books to be used during therapy sessions.

We welcome our friends and supporters to visit the McCloskey Cares Clinic to see firsthand the beautiful spaces created throughout the clinic. This truly friendly environment will promote healing and will be a destination the children and families will look forward to revisiting.

CMCS DONOR PROFILE

Mary Theresa and John McCombe

Mary Theresa McCombe and her husband, John, have been dedicated partners in the CMCS mission for over 12 years. Their generosity and commitment to the agency includes their focus on specific activities, such as John's dedication to the CMCS golf outing and Mary Theresa's personal interest in issues related to foster care and youth aging out of care. Both have shown the dedicated efforts that lead to decisive results

"While one percent of youth in foster care may enter a four year college, less than 2 percent ever get their degree before the age of 25, compared with 24 percent of the general population..."

As the parents of three children, the McCombes recognize the variety of expenses associated with a college education. They are also profoundly aware of the challenges confronting youth in foster care and the overwhelming challenges these youth face in pursuing an education. These challenges are the results of multiple placements leading to increased frequency in changing schools, which can deny youth in care the stable social and educational foundations that are essential to maneuver through the college selection and the financial aid processes. While CMCS staff guide each student in the 'Preparing Youth for Adulthood' programs, the absence of a parent or other mentor who provides financial and emotional support during college years is the most frequent reason the college dropout rate amongst these youth is so high.

Mary Theresa, seeing the urgency and difficulties facing a youth trying to remain in school, took the lead. Working with CMCS staff, she created and underwrote the McCombe College and Vocational School Assistance Program. In three years, over 45 young men and women have benefited from her program and funding. Not one of these 45 youth needed to leave college or training due to financial needs.

Scholarships and financial aid do not

cover many expenses facing students. As this program evolved, CMCS staff monitored the students as they settled into their studies and urged them to communicate shortfalls and the essentials they needed. Books, school supplies, outfitting, dorm rooms, travel expenses, medical emergencies, and materials for

independent projects, computers, software, and supplemental food cards quickly surfaced as areas where financial help was required.

Youth who have decided to follow a vocational training program have also benefited from McCombe funding. Fund for tuition, fees, licensing, uniforms, equipment, tools, and books have helped young men and women enter into a variety of fields and occupations including; fitness instructor, chef and food services, security work, beautician and cosmetology.

McCombe funding on average was just \$1,266 per student. This is a relatively low sum considering that it represents a huge investment in the personal human potential of each youth. By allowing students in foster care to continue in college or vocational training, we have seen the power that an education has reflected in more youth achieving their dreams of being proud of their educational successes and in being able to provide for themselves.

A quote from Lee lacocca

"I was fortunate to get a scholarship when I went to
Lehigh University and Princeton...
Somebody was kind enough to spend their money to educate people that they would never get to know. That's what I think philanthropy is about."

Sincere altruism, honed organizational skills, and masterful networking capabilities characterize Mary Theresa whose charitable work in her own community and far beyond, has touched so many lives. In 2016, Mary Theresa's second venture for foster youth also began at CMCS. Through the Hearts to Homes program, donors purchased essential household furnishings and made monetary donations to supply the many things needed to furnish a first home for a young adult aging out of care. CMCS staff help each young adult create a "wish list" that included items such as bedlinens, cookware, furniture, lighting, cleaning supplies and other necessities providing all the household furnishings needed as a young adult begins their new independent life. Hearts to Homes is now an independent agency, supporting youth at eight different foster care agencies, including Cardinal McCloskey. CMCS is very fortunate to have the partnership of John and Mary Theresa McCombe. Mary Theresa's ingenuity along with her philanthropic commitment has provided many youth aging out of foster care with support and comfort. She's offered a caring helping hand as they set out to lead independent and fulfilling lives.

CMCS' ANNUAL PLANNING
